The Woodbury County Board of Supervisors agreed to pay for one half of rural Woodbury County communities' membership dues to SIMPCO for FY 2019 (July 1, 2017 – June 30, 2018). The goal of the partnership is for rural Woodbury County communities to utilize the Siouxland Interstate Metropolitan Planning Council (SIMPCO) in providing tools, research, technical assistance and regional collaboration to help grow community and economic development project across Woodbury County.

For FY 2018, the following communities signed-up for a SIMPCO Membership: Anthon, Bronson, Correctionville, Cushing, Danbury, Hornick, Lawton, Moville, Oto, Salix, Sergeant Bluff and Smithland.

At the end of the 3rd quarter, SIMPCO had been in contact with all ten communities, developing projects or working on specific projects. Information in this report demonstrates project(s)/information requested, total time, and estimated value of services offered directly to each of the communities as well as the indirect value of SIMPCO membership and regional collaboration.

During the 3rd quarter, SIMPCO spent approximately 154 direct hours which equals an estimated value of \$10,472 assisting member communities in Woodbury County. Indirect time working on projects, committees, regional projects, and outreach that indirectly benefits Woodbury County communities is estimated at 381 hours or an estimated value of \$25,908. The net benefit of SIMPCO membership for rural Woodbury County communities in the third quarter is equaled \$36,380.

- SIMPCO is a sponsor and part of the planning committee for the Mid-states Community and Economic Development Conference Planning Committee. This conference was held in April 2018. The conference is one of the largest rural development events in the three state region and is a joint project of several agencies and organizations in Iowa, Nebraska and South Dakota. It is designed for local leaders and offers workshops on strategies and ideas for rural development. Woodbury County communities will be encouraged to attend the event.
- During the 3rd quarter SIMPCO staff continued to worked with the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA) on an application to conduct a U.S. 20 Highway Economic Development Study. Staff spent time presenting the study proposal to the Woodbury County communities and gaining support as well as matching funds. SIMPCO is pleased to announce that we were awarded the funding from U.S EDA and will start the study in May. The kick-off meeting will take place on May 23 at 6 pm in Correctionville.
- Through SIMPCO's Western Iowa Community Improvement Regional Housing Trust Fund, staff spent approximately 20 hours working with home owners on housing rehabilitation projects. Currently there are projects being done in Correctionville, Bronson, Moville and Cushing.
- SIMPCO continues to work with Woodbury County, Sergeant Bluff, Sioux City and the Iowa DOT on the Interchange Justification Report (IJR) for Woodbury County. SIMPCO staff spent time in the 3rd quarter running modeling scenarios.
- SIMPCO held our first Membership Workshop at Western Iowa Tech Community College in Sioux City on March 2. At the workshop, members were given the chance to find out what SIMPCO is all about. The Membership Workshop included organizational structure, committees to participate in, divisions within the organization and how to get more involved. SIMPCO staff provided information on grants and how SIMPCO can assist members with grant applications, comprehensive plans, GIS mapping projects, municipal code and zoning updates. Additional information was presented on housing including, funding for home-owner rehabilitation projects through the Housing Trust Fund. Attendees included Anthon, Moville, Lawton, Salix and Sergeant Bluff
- The 3rd quarter provided to be busy with grant writing for Woodbury County communities. Moville, Lawton and Correctionville were successful at receiving a

Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) grant through the Siouxland Regional Transportation Planning Association. SIMPCO also assisted Anthon, Danbury, and Salix with MHRD grants. SIMPCO is currently assisting Correctionville with a CDBG grant which will be submitted in the 4th quarter. During the 3rd quarter we also assisted with grant writing and research on the Iowa Initiative for Sustainable Communities, USDA grants and IEDA Community Catalyst Grant for Correctionville and Moville.

- During the 3rd quarter, SIMPCO staff spent time planning and promoting our Annual Meeting. The guest speaker will be Mark Lowe from the Iowa DOT. This is a great chance for members to come network and find out more about SIMPCO.
- Other opportunities for SIMPCO members to get involved during the 3rd quarter including the Regional Policy and Legislative Committee meetings (held in February & March) and the SIMPCO Board of Directors meetings (held in January & March).
- Unlike the other rural Woodbury County communities, Sergeant Bluff is part of the SIMPCO Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) and the urban area of Sioux City. MPO work may not be specifically directed to Sergeant Bluff but pertains to metropolitan transportation planning as a whole and Sergeant Bluff's placement in the MPO. Twenty percent of MPO funds are from MPO members' dues used as local match to complete the necessary work required to ensure federal transportation funds continue to flow into the metropolitan region.
- SIMPCO leads or participates in several groups and committees that benefit Woodbury County rural communities through regional cooperation. During the first quarter, SIMPCO lead or participated in the following committees/boards/organizations/groups:

- SIMPCO will continue to work with Siouxland District Health Department on projects related to Safe Routes to School and bicycle/pedestrian improvements in Sergeant Bluff, Lawton, Bronson and Moville.
- SIMPCO will begin work on the U.S. Highway 20 Economic Development Corridor Study. This includes a public meeting and working with communities along the corridor.
- SIMPCO will continue to distribute electronic newsletters and grant blasts about upcoming activities/events/trainings/grants.
- During the 4th quarter SIMPCO will host our Annual Meeting, with guest speaker, Mark Lowe, Iowa DOT Director
- Also during the 4th quarter SIMPCO will work Grow Siouxland Taskforce to develop the scope of work for a Regional Housing Study. This is an identified need to those communities along the I-29 corridor. Funding to complete the study is still to be determined.

 we need a champion in the community to be able to give SIMPCO direction and the
 information needed to prepare the grant.

Opportunities:

- The U.S. 20 Highway Economic Development Study. Several of the communities along the corridor and the entire County will benefit from the plan.
- SIMPCO is planning our Annual Meeting for May 10th in Sergeant Bluff. This is a great opportunity for our members to network with other Siouxland communities and to learn more about SIMPCO.
- There are plenty of grant opportunities listed on the SIMPCO website! Members should prioritize projects and contact SIMPCO to begin working applications.
- Members should utilize SIMPCO GIS services to update and digitize city maps
